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FOREWORD



I am pleased to introduce our Holiday Activity and Food (HAF) programme report for our 2023-24 year of activities. The programme aims to provide healthy meals and enjoyable and stimulating activities for children and young people during the Easter, Summer, and Christmas Holidays.

The HAF Programme was established nationally in response to the growing concern about the lack of access to healthy food and engaging activities for

children and young people during school holidays. Research has shown that children and young people from disadvantaged backgrounds are at a higher risk of food insecurity and social isolation during the holidays, which can have a negative impact on their health and well-being. This report details the positive impact the programme has had on children, young people and their families across Hackney.

In total, our wide range of settings in Hackney offered 63,202 meals and activity sessions over the year.

Our small and wonderful HAF team worked with schools and settings, Young Hackney, community groups and local grass-roots organisations to build a sustainable offer that benefitted the whole community in hackney. We are particularly pleased to have extended the programme to our Orthodox Jewish Charedi community who offered 2,523 places through HAF this year.

Thank you to all our providers, council officers and dedicated steering committee who continue to contribute to the HAF programme, ensuring the best outcomes for our children and young people, across the Borough.

INTRODUCTION

The Holiday Activities and Food Programme

The <u>Holiday Activities and Food (HAF) Programme</u> is a national programme funded by the Department for Education, organising clubs, events and enriching activities based around physical activity, healthy eating and nutritional education, along with arts, crafts, activities, games and social events to help young people during school holidays.

While many clubs are open to all, those eligible for Free School Meals benefits can access the programme for free. In addition to this, local authorities may choose to spend up to 15% of their grant on those that they feel will benefit.

Over £200M is divided nationally between local authorities and boroughs each year, using the number of free school meals benefits eligible young people in each borough to determine the allocation amount.


Since 2022, the HAF Programme has delivered an incredible 10.7 million fun-filled days to young people across the nation. With each year expanded in reach, providing 5.4 million days between Christmas 2022, Easter, and summer 2023 alone.

Who Can Join the Fun?

HAF is primarily for school-aged children from reception to year 11, and is completely free for those who receive benefits-related <u>free school meals</u> (FSM). For SEND pupils still in formal education, the maximum age extends to 18.

Those not eligible for benefits-related free school meals can also attend the majority of clubs, although some may charge a small fee per day.

Clubs are inclusive, and cater to SEND pupils, with some specialist clubs for those with complex needs.





INTRODUCTION

Aims of the Programme

Research has shown that school holidays can be challenging for many families, especially in a cost-of-living crisis, which often results in a holiday experience gap. Those from lower-income households are:

- Less likely to participate in organised out-of-school activities
- More prone to experiencing 'unhealthy holidays' in terms of nutrition and physical health
- More susceptible to social isolation, which in turn has a negative impact on the lives and development of young people

The HAF programme addresses this issue. Evidence suggests that free holiday clubs can positively impact children and young people and that these clubs are most effective when they:

- Provide consistent and easily accessible enrichment activities
- Offer more than just breakfast or lunch
- Involve children and parents in food preparation
- Leverage local partnerships and connections, particularly with the voluntary and community sector (VSCO).

HAF Specification

With the above aims in mind, the HAF programme ensures that HAF providers offer young people:

- healthy and nutritious meals
- a healthy level of physical activity
- the chance to have fun and meet new friends
- develop a greater understanding of food, nutrition and other health related issues
- take part in fun and engaging activities that support their development and well-being
- feel safe and secure
- get access to the right support services
- return to school feeling engaged and ready to learn





FUNDING

Funding Category Definitions

Total Grant Allocation	This is the total amount of money awarded to Hackney for use on the HAF scheme for the financial year 2023/4
Contingency Grant	Some years, the DfE had a contingency fund for winter HAF. This meant that if a borough spent above a certain percentage threshold of the total grant allocation during the spring and summer HAF offerings, they could apply for an extension to their grant allocation. This was approximately 5% extra funding, to either offer more places if there was capacity to do so, or to mitigate the risk of over-expenditure.
	There was no contingency grant allowed for 2023/4.
Face-to-Face Club Provision	This is the money that is given to the HAF clubs to operate. The funding is on a per-head and per-day basis only for those eligible for free school meals benefits or within the 15% allocation. Additional funding was given to support free school meals benefits eligible SEND children/young people. Some funding was also spent on resources, such as equipment.
	Hackney funds actual attendance only, rather than funding the number of booked places.
Remote Club Provision	This would be for clubs that operate online only Hackney did not operate any remote clubs in 2023/4.
Publicity and Communications	This is for any advertising conducted by the borough (rather than by the clubs themselves) and for any communications costs, such as graphic design for publications, posters, letters or flyers.
	Hackney had a two page advertisement in the Hackney Summer Guide. The decentralised nature of Hackney's offer, meant that the clubs conducted their own advertising to their existing client base within the community.
Capital Expenditure	This is an allocation used to award extra funding to clubs to acquire, upgrade, or maintain physical assets such as sports equipment for use within the HAF clubs.
Administration:	This is for paying the costs of the staff that are directly involved in running Hackney HAF. This includes the HAF Coordinator, Deputy HAF Coordinator, Business Support Officers, Management, Accounts and Legal.
Other Costs	Other costs (e.g., translations, transport, provider staff training, booking systems etc.)
	Most boroughs use a centralised booking system, however, Hackney has developed an in-house FSM checking database system which has negated the need to outsource this expensive task. The saving is therefore used to fund more places in the HAF clubs for young people. The accessibility of the scheme for the most financially vulnerable is also enhanced by this system.



Unique Attendee Definition

The DfE defines a unique attendee as any single person that attends at any point during the scheme, rather than as the sum of the total attendance on each day. The difference being that one young person may attend a club for sixteen days. In this example, the number of unique attendees that this young person accounts for would be counted as one rather than sixteen.



Unique Attendee Categories





Session (HAF Day) Definition

If one young person attends a club every day for 16 days, this is said to be 16 sessions or HAF days. Another way to think about this metric is the number of healthy, nutritious meals consumed.




Seasonal Distribution in HAF Days







SEND Teaching Assistant For Each Club

For SEND young people with less complex needs, Hackney provides funding for each HAF club to hire an additional SEND specific teaching assistant. Clubs which require more than one TA can also request additional funding for multiple SEND teaching assistants (awarded on a case-by-case basis where budget allows).



FOOD EDUCATION

Hackney School of Food

The Hackney School of Food was established in March 2020 by the LEAP Federation of Schools (Gayhurst Community School, Kingsmead Primary and Mandeville Primary) in partnership with the charity Chefs in Schools. It was created by transforming a derelict and unused former caretaker's house into a professional kitchen and garden.

Teaching the Teachers

Every year, Hackney HAF organises food educational programmes for the staff at HAF clubs, to empower them to teach cooking skills to young people in the most fun, effective, safe and engaging way. Many of the HAF clubs have on-site kitchens, so it is important to train the providers to deliver these essential skills.

The Hackney School of food presents a series of online classes for HAF provider staff, covering topics such as kitchen safety, how to teach young people to use a kitchen knife safely, suitable menu and recipe selection for all age groups, allergies and food intolerances.



TRAINING AND GUIDANCE

Level 2 Food Hygiene Certificate, Allergy Training and Food Standards

All HAF clubs are involved in either making or distributing food, and therefore are legally required to have a food hygiene certificate.

Hackney HAF will fund <u>level 2 certification</u> for providers.

All food provided as part of the HAF programme must:

- comply with regulations on food preparation
- take into account allergies and dietary requirements (see the <u>allergy guidance</u> <u>for schools</u>)
- take into account any religious or cultural requirements for food

First Aid Refresher

EMT First Aid provide interactive first aid classes for all HAF club staff, teaching the essential skills needed to deal with a first aid emergency.



Safeguarding and Risk Assessment Refreshers

Safeguarding is paramount within Hackney's HAF clubs, therefore representatives from each of the clubs must attend a safeguarding refresher to ensure that clubs are compliant with keeping children safe in education guidance, run by Hackney Education's Safeguarding Consultant, James Sykes.

Topics covered include:

- How to identify if an incident has met threshold for referral to services
- Making Multi-Agency Safeguarding Hub referrals for safeguarding incidents
- Types of incidents to look out for
- What to do in an emergency
- What information to gather when an incident has taken place

Risk Assessment training is also provided by Hackney Education

Police Community Engagement Team

Officer's from the Metropolitan Police's Community Engagement Team are available to attend clubs and talk to the young people about their work in the borough and to give advice.

THE FUTURE

DfE Funding

The current four year grant cycle for HAF is due to finish at the end of the current financial year in March 2025. It is not yet clear if there will be an extension of the scheme, and this is very unlikely to be determined until after the general election has been decided and the government outlines the parliamentary budget.

HAF Provider Framework

Three years ago, Hackney Education set up a multi-year framework for club providers, to simplify the application process for running a club each season and to prevent the need to tender three times per year. A framework tender was conducted and providers were given a specification for the requirements for running a HAF club within Hackney, which included detailed descriptions of their club, financial scrutiny, safeguarding and policy checks. Applicants were scored according to the given specification and successful applicants were added to the HAF framework, meaning that they only need to submit a simple expression of interest to be included on a forthcoming season of HAF. Procurement law prevents new clubs from being added to the HAF scheme without a new tender, unless they are already operating within a Hackney based school.

The existing Hackney HAF provider framework is due to expire with the current DfE funding cycle on the 31st of March. 2025. Although we do not yet know if there will be further HAF funding and a continuation of the scheme, we have begun specifying a new multi-year HAF provider framework tender, which we hope will go live in September 2024 if there is a further HAF funding cycle in the next budget.
