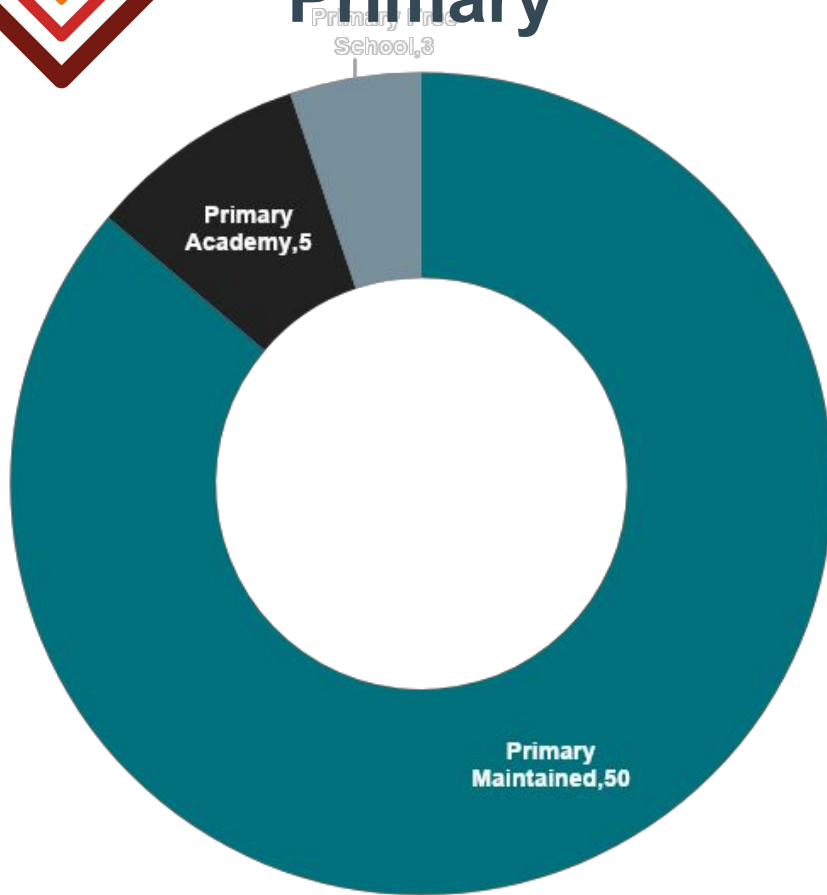

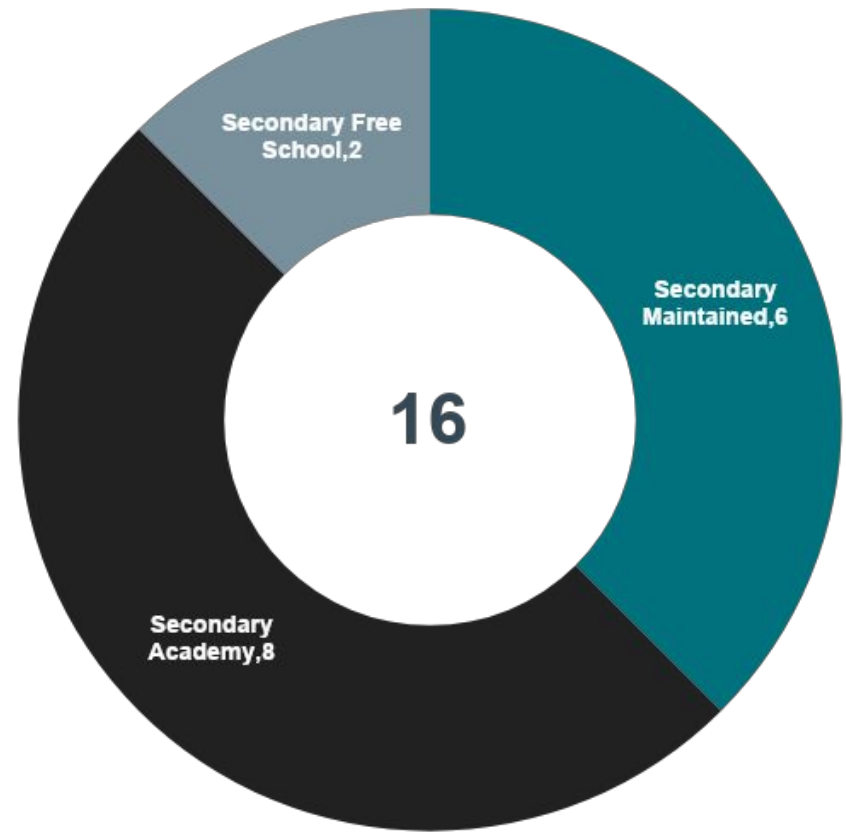

Figures to be proud of in Hackney Education

- OFSTED: 95% in good or outstanding schools (nat avge 86%)
- GCSEs: 69% standard pass in Eng and Maths (nat avge 64%) (56/41)
- KS2: Hackney average 68% RWM over three years (nat avge 63%)

Figures to have concern about

- 8.1% secondary pupils had a fixed term exclusion 2017 (national 4.6%)
- Black Caribbean boys disproportionality: Progress 8

Hackney Community in Context

Demography and Deprivation

Age: 25% are under 20 years.

Proportion of residents between 20-29 years has grown in the last ten years to just under 25%.

Life expectancy is below the London average, especially for men

Cultural Diversity:

Over 1/3 of residents were born outside the UK.

Populations groups include: 'Other White', Black, Turkish/Kurdish.

A large Charedi Jewish community is located in the North of the borough.

Deprivation: Community is becoming less deprived than other LAs in relation to income, employment, housing: in 2010 ranked 2nd most deprived LA, in 2015 moved to 11th rank. However during Covid FSM moved to 36.6%.

Financial poverty and employment: In 2016-17, 36% of residents were living in financial poverty – with incomes of less than 60% of the national median after housing costs.

Housing: Home ownership is highest amongst the Asian and White populations. Black residents are most likely to live in social housing.

Hackney Community in Context

Factors contributing to lived experience of Inequality

Health: 4th highest rate of child poverty in London (and linked poor health).
Recorded prevalence of severe mental health conditions is amongst the highest in London.
Nearly 50% of children in LA care (approx. 400 in total) have mental illness, compared to 10% of the general population; increasing to 70% among children living in residential care.

Social care: Children of Black ethnicity are over represented - of looked after children, 45% are black, from a local 0-19 population of 29%

SEN: The Hackney average is 19%.
26% of pupils entitled to FSM have SEN, compared with 15% of non-FSM pupils.
27% of Caribbean pupils have an identified SEN, while 21% of Turkish, Cypriot and Kurdish pupils do.

Crime and youth offenders: Crime in Hackney is now higher than in other London LAs with similar social and economic characteristics. Black residents are also most likely to be searched, as part of stop-and-search, compared with Asian and White residents. In Hackney, in 2017/18, 78% of young people cautioned or sentenced in Hackney were Black Asian Minority Ethnic (BAME).

Points to note: 2017-18 analysis indicated PEX were: 75% single parent families; 60% FSM; 60% have had at least one previous school move (other than primary-secondary transition); 60% SEND – of whom almost 2/3rds have a mental health related need.

Hackney Education Priorities

1. Achievement of all groups of young people, age 0 to 25.
2. A standard of care and education which is good, or better, for those who need it most. Ensuring all children are included and well cared for; developing positive physical, emotional and mental health approaches.
3. With schools, reduce exclusions to well below national levels.
4. We will provide excellent provision for SEND young people.



Hackney Education Priorities

5. Developing educational practice for our young people in the Orthodox Jewish community and significantly improving outcomes for black boys and men
6. Our schools/settings and HLT are excellent workplaces where staff flourish, develop and stay.
7. Provide a full range of services to schools and settings through statutory, discretionary and traded services
8. Implement a structure which encompasses our family of schools/settings (HSG Board) and our role as part of the council.
